Princeton - Mary Catherine Warren, 83, of Princeton, IL passed away on Wednesday, August 18, 2021 at Aperion Care in Princeton.

Mary was born on July 3, 1938 in Quincy, IL to the late Willie and Audry (Peterson) Wear. She graduated from Mt Sterling High School, Class of 1956. She obtained her bachelor's degree for teaching at Western Illinois University. She started her career at 19 at Sparland High School on a provisional certification after only two years of college. She worked at Roseville High School, in Roseville, IL. Then worked for Putnam County in 1966, teaching English and minored in Library Science. Retiring after 27 years of service. She was instrumental in putting speech back into the curriculum.

She was married to the late Merle Seckler, who passed away many years ago. She remarried Charles "Ray" Warren, October 24, 2008 in Henry County. They lived in Bureau, until moving to Spring Valley and in 2017 they moved back to Princeton, IL.

Mary and Ray put together a company in Spring Valley "The Doctors of Doll-Ology. They would travel around and do repairs to dolls, sell and repair doll clothing, and accessories, hitting local vendor shows as well. Repairing antique dolls was a specialty of theirs. Her and Ray enjoyed camping in their travel camper and would spend the winters in Arkansas or Texas.

She is survived by her husband of 12 years, Ray Warren of Princeton, IL; one sister, Ruth (Roy) Baker of Quincy, IL; one brother Earl (Catherine) Wear of Moline, IL; four Stepchildren, Stephen Warren, Connie Hoffman, Denise Grundman and Anthony Warren.

Preceded in death by her parents, Willie and Audry Wear, two sisters, Norma Huff and Lila Kerr, and her first husband, Merle Seckler.

She gifted me with a beautiful baby doll on our last visit and I will treasure it always. Mary was a wonderful mentor and later friend to both me and my family.
